

Course Syllabus

Italian A: Culture and Society, Southern Italy 7.5 Credits*, First Cycle

Learning Outcomes

On completion of the course, students shall, in Italian, be able to:

- describe and discuss the main features of Italian geography, history, culture, society and government
- describe and discuss how southern Italy distinguishes itself in terms of geography, history, culture and society compared to other regions.

Course Content

The course gives an introduction to the main aspects of Italian geography, history, culture and government. The course focuses on the aspects that differentiate southern Italy from other regions. Emphasis is on the last centuries through selected prose, newspaper articles and audiovisual materials.

Assessment

The course is examined continuously through assessment of active participation in seminars, oral presentations, written assignments, and a written examination.

Forms of Study

Obligatory seminars in which students shall participate actively and interact with their peers. The language of instruction is Italian.

Grades

The Swedish grades U-VG.

To achieve the grade of VG in the whole course, students must achieve VG in modules 2 and 3.

Module 1: Active Participation in Seminars and Oral Presentations - 2 cr

Module 2: Written Assignments - 2 cr Module 3: Final Written Exam - 3.5 cr
